The Queen remembered

he British people and perhaps even the Queen herself did not fully grasp the world wide affection in which she was held and what influence she and, through her, the United Kingdom had throughout the World.

Queen Elizabeth II was always dignified, smiling, genuinely interested in her subjects, loved for her humour and optimism and a hardworking pillar of the Nation State and that vast collection of Nation States which is the British Commonwealth.

So many millions around the world have a feeling of great loss. A full-page headline in a German quality newspaper read "The world cries for the Queen". How many hundreds of millions of people throughout the world would refer to only one person as "the Queen". I reproduce here the words of a long-time friend Bernard Chalumeau, President of the Alliance for the Sovereignty of France:

Here too, we all feel to have lost someone in our own family. We all thought she was eternal: at all the ages of her life, she was so pretty, so smiling, so present, so brave, so close. She was the United Kingdom! She embodied the United Kingdom! Before her death, we were very close, after we are even closer! It is the miracle of sovereignty which, throughout the world, brings together free peoples. Never forget her! Never!

The Queen was always well received in France - she was after all the Duke of Normandy! The Queen was always cheerful, kind and optimistic - how much more powerful than a thousand international treaties! As she said many years ago:

"I cannot lead you into battle, I do not give you laws or administer justice, but I can do something else. I can give you my heart and my devotion to these old islands and to all the peoples of our brotherhood of nations."

Only because she loved her own people could she show compassion for other nations. She did indeed touch the hearts of millions around the world. She was genuinely interested in people and in her own Government and having appointed 15 Prime Ministers she could offer a wise historical word to temper the fevered brow of politics. And she had a ready wit. Like Oueen Victoria, Elizabeth loved her home in Windsor Castle close to Heathrow Airport. When visiting Surrey she talked to a resident plagued by the noise of aircraft flying into Gatwick airport "like your Majesty at Windsor". "Yes", the Queen replied -"we are thinking of moving"

EU lifts some Russian sanctions

he European Union has lifted some restrictions on the trade and financing of Russian coal, and some chemicals, to avoid an energy and food security crisis in poorer countries.

Coal "should be allowed to combat food and energy insecurity around the world," the EU Commission wrote in guidance shared with EU member states on Monday (19th September).

Animal feed and some chemicals used in fertilisers and fuels are also allowed to be financed and shipped by EU operators to third countries.

A group of EU countries, including Poland and the Baltic nations, have criticised the partial loosening of sanctions, fearing it will further support Russian war efforts.

But EU efforts to quit Russian fossil fuels are hamstrung by the inherent risk it poses to global energy and food security.

The resurgent coal demand, driven by Europe's energy and gas crunch, has pushed prices to \$441 per tonne, a near all-time high, threatening energy security all over the globe.

And new research by the Bank of

New research, conducted by the Royal Automobile Association (RAC), has revealed that the cost of using public charge points on a pay-asyou-go basis for electric cars in the UK has increased by as much as 42 per cent in the last four months.

Simon Williams, a spokesperson for the RAC, said: "It remains the case that charging away from home costs less than refuelling a petrol or diesel car, International Settlements, the Baselbased supervisor of central banks, suggests the effects of the EU embargo on Russian oil, which will come into force on 5th December, may even be more profound.

"We argue that a substitution of Russian oil exports would be difficult, implying that restrictions on these exports may result in large and persistent price increases for oil-related products," the study's authors, Fernando Avalos and Wenqian Huang, wrote on Sunday (18th September).

This could increase the price of grain, maize and other foods such as soybeans for years by boosting the use of biofuels, such as ethanol and biodiesel.

"Higher oil prices create incentives for gasoline blenders to increase the ethanol content in their product," the authors write.

Although this can moderate the surge in oil prices, it would also increase the demand for corn, sugarcane, wheat, barley and sorghum and products used to produce biodiesel, such as palm oil, which is also used in

a wide range of processed foods.

Corn is especially important, with 40 percent of the US harvest, the world's biggest corn producer, going to ethanol production.

With less corn available as foodstuff for cows, pigs and chickens, higher prices will spill over to replacements like soybeans, pushing up the price of meat.

EU sanctions do not directly target agricultural goods, but the embargo on Russian fossil fuels is likely to keep prices elevated, Avalos and Huang write.

"Understanding the complex interlinkages across commodity sectors is essential for policymakers if they are to ward off debilitating effects on energy and agricultural output," they conclude.

"The EU is fully committed to avoiding that its sanctions unduly impact trade in critical items to third countries around the globe," European commission spokesman Daniel Ferrie said in a statement.

Running costs

Despite this, a transport expert has insisted that drivers in Britain shouldn't be discouraged for investing in an electric vehicle.

Automobile Association (AA) head of roads policy Jack Cousens said: "With domestic energy prices rising, drivers can be forgiven for believing switching to an Electric Vehicle (EV) will become expensive quickly.

"However, the reality is that even with the hike in domestic electricity costs, running an EV is considerably cheaper than a petrol or diesel car."

CO2 Nature's gift

his book follows Nieboer's very successful book last year on the acquisition that CO₂ is creating global warming.

In this publication he produces many more facts and figures that support his approach on climate change.

how greenhouse gasses absorb just 6% of solar energy from which CO₂ creates 20% of the greenhouse effect. Explains how absorbed solar energy rising by convection allows radiation to space at higher altitudes and cooling by descending cold air. Describes how saturation of the absorbed wavelength bands with radiation means that doubling CO₂ only causes a 1% rise in temperature (3Wm²) or no more than 1°C.

3) Shows that there is no causal correlation between increases in CO₂ and temperature. It defines the close correlation of temperature with solar activity. It demonstrates the invalidity of climate models of past temperature

and the distortions of predicted temperature. It explains how satellite data shows that temperature has risen by just 0.27% since 1980 and that there has ben no warming trend since 1998.

4) Describes the miracle of photosynthesis of Nature using CO₂ sunlight and water to form sugar and starch in plants as energy stores. Transpiration, respiration and photorespiration are explained and how present CO₂ levels are 3 times lower than optimum. It explains the devastating effects on growth and survival of plants of falling levels of CO₂ and shows how rises in CO₂ result in abundant crop yields and values.

One of the conclusions he draws is that we must regain self sufficiency in energy - energy that is abundant and a ffordable. This can only be guaranteed by exploiting the fossil fuels that lie under the surface of our lands and seas in the knowledge that emissions of CO₂ can only be of benefit to all humanity.

After reading this very informative publication, no one should be left in any doubt as to the requirement of maintaining high CO₂ levels.

Fixing the energy price crisis

he UK government has recently announced a cap on energy charges for UK consumers, but is there a further way to help the consumer?

The following was taken from a cost sheet number 5 produced by Net Zero Watch, prior to the further government announcements.

Introduction

The futures markets are signalling that the energy crisis will continue unabated for more than three years. If this is allowed to happen, the results will be catastrophic.

This fact-sheet presents concrete steps that the Government can take to reduce energy prices in the next two winters. Regarding the latter, it is vital that steps are taken immediately, so that the gains are delivered in time.

The measures are unapologetically radical. Two decades of conventional wisdom have resulted in the current crisis. Fixing the problem will take many years, and the situation will only start to improve once we move to a radically new path.

For each measure, rough estimates of the benefits are given in total, and in per-household terms, the latter figure arrived at by dividing by 27 million. Consumers would experience some of these savings through bill reductions, and some through reductions in the cost of living.

Winter 2022–23 - Some measures can provide relief in winter 2022–23:

* Suspend the Emissions Trading System - Large energy users, including, critically, the gas-fired power stations that set market prices, pay £70–80 to emit a tonne of CO2¹. Those marginal power stations currently emit 0.41tCO2 /MWh², so emission permits are adding up to £30 per megawatt hour, which equates to £10 billion over the market as a whole³, or around £370 per household. Leaving in place a fixed carbon allowance of, say, £20/t would reduce the savings to £8 billion, or £300 per household.

- * French electricity connectors -Since the spring, French electricity prices have been around €80 higher than in the UK. The futures markets are signalling that this differential will become much larger in the next 12 months. Marginal generators in the UK therefore export power rather than supply to the local market, pushing up UK electricity prices across the board. interconnectors should restricted to system balancing and emergency use only, through formal agreement with the French. At €80, savings would amount to £22 billion, or £810 per household4.
- * Reduce the value of ROCs to zero Wind and solar operating under the Renewables Obligation are currently earning very high market prices, with a very high subsidy on top. These generators have a right to Renewables Obligation Certificates, but their value is set by the Government, and can be reduced to zero. The scheme is expected to cost £6.8 billion in 2022–23 5, amounting to £229 per household.
- * Other direct savings Cancelling green spending programmes subsidies for EVs, EV chargers, heat pumps and so on as well as cancelling the Smart Meter Programme and the mandate for ethanol in petrol would bring up to another £3 billion saving, or £111 per household⁶.

Summary

If all these measures taken together, the total savings delivered for winter 2022–23 would thus amount to £41 billion, or just over £1,500 per household.

Winter 2023–24 - As noted in the introduction, energy prices are unlikely to return to normal before winter 2023–24. Actions that bring savings on timescales of 1–2 years therefore come into play. In each case, immediate action is required to ensure the benefits are delivered on the timescale indicated:

* Replacing marginal gas generation plant - Electricity prices in the UK are set by old, inefficient gas-fired power stations. Average thermal efficiency of UK gas-fired units is 48%. Marginal units will be lower. A 5% more efficient marginal unit reduces market prices by around £15/MWh7, bringing savings of £5 billion, or £184 per household. However, since net zero policies have destroyed investor confidence, plant replacement – new turbines, in other words would need to be paid for by the taxpayer. These should be dual fuel units - capable of running on gasoil, which is likely to be cheaper in times of tight gas supply. The government should also pay for gasoil storage facilities at the power stations. There may be a queue for new plant, so time is of the essence.

* A green light for shale gas - Giving a green light to onshore gas in the UK will reduce gas prices somewhat, although the effect will be limited. Any reduction will, however, reduce electricity market prices across the board. Speed is of the essence. With planning permission mostly having lapsed, it would be necessary for the Secretary of State to call in new applications as soon as they were filed. In addition, the Traffic Light System for seismic activity would need to be set at a rational level, perhaps through reference to the British Standard on Noise and Vibration. With these steps in place, gas might start to flow in 12 months. The effect on gas prices is hard to quantify, but a 10p/therm (2%) reduction would lower electricity prices by £15/MWh, a saving of £5 billion per year, or £184 per household. The saving in gas used for domestic heating and industrial heat would be around £1.5billion, or £54 per household.

* Reduce exposure to high EU gas prices - Our marginal therm of gas, which often comes from the EU, is very expensive. European benchmark prices have reached €100/MWh, because of Russian cuts to supply to Germany, while LNG can be had for around €50/MWh. This raises market prices across the board. Eliminating this supply, and replacing it with LNG,

would therefore bring savings for consumers, perhaps of as much as £24 billion, or £894 per household 8. Achieving this would involve securing new long-term supply contracts for LNG. It will also be necessary for gasfired power stations to run sufficiently often to ensure that they can use the fuel delivered.

In total, further savings of £32 billion, or nearly £1,200 per household could be delivered.

Therefore, in the space of two or three years, costs could be reduced by £73 billion, or £2,695 per household.

Red herrings

Some steps that are widely proposed are in essence pleading by special interests, and will do nothing to help consumers in the short term anyway.

Insulation programmes

Most of the 'low-hanging' fruit of demand reduction – loft insulation, double glazing etc – has been

harvested. Programmes that go further will be very expensive, putting further pressure on households, will take years to deliver, and will often fail to meet expectations. Many previous such programmes have been disastrous, with millions of homes damaged by botched work.

Increasing renewables

Increasing renewables will increase electricity market prices, because it will increase the unit cost of gasfired power stations, which set market prices. The prices of all forms of generation are currently high, but, unlike fossil fuels, there is little hope of renewables ever becoming cheap.
